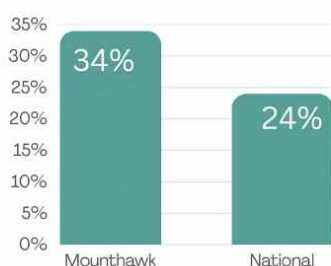

I am writing my final Summer Newsletter article with a certain nostalgia, but more so with a spirit of gratitude. It does not seem like 24 years since we opened our doors here in Mercy Mounthawk. As we turn into the 25th anniversary of the foundation of the school, it seems like a suitable moment to hand on the baton, and there is much for which I am thankful over that time.

It has been a privilege in my life to have had the opportunity, since my appointment to the management team in the amalgamation of 2001, to contribute to the establishment and growth of this wonderful school. In terms of bricks and mortar, we opened the main building, we developed the centenary hall block, the fitness suite, the recent modular accommodation including special classes, and of course, we look forward to the next multi-million euro extension with enhanced facilities for the practical and STEM subjects. Progress continues...

More centrally, in the amalgamation, we inherited the strong tradition of Mercy education in Tralee from the Mercy sisters, and together with a dedicated staff over those 24 years we have translated that ethos and embedded it in the culture of the Ireland of the 21st century, in a progressive, welcoming and transformative school with the highest of standards. We owe the young people of Tralee the best in educational opportunity and I believe we have grown a school that offers that possibility.

With that educational vision, we introduced a broad curriculum of 22 Leaving Certificate subjects in 2001 and new subjects such as PE, Coding, Performance and Dance, Polish and Chinese have been added to broaden the range

available to students. Our students achieve to the highest levels nationally, with the percentage of those achieving over 600 points consistently above the national 6% norm. Last year 17% of our students achieved over 550 points in the Leaving Certificate and 34% achieved over 500 points against 24% nationally.

Our co-curricular programme has blossomed also over the years and we feature regularly on the national stage in so many areas. We have won countless regional and national titles in BT Young Scientist, Scifest, Young Social Innovators, Eco-Unesco, Robotics, Can-Sat, Poetry Aloud, Drama and Musical productions, and Choir, with regular All-Ireland level involvement in basketball, football, camogie and athletics also. It has been a joy to witness the energy, dedication and innovation of so many gifted and talented students and teachers over the years.

In all, it has been a fulfilling career in Mounthawk, shared with an enthusiastic and generous staff that has a commitment and dedication second to none. Thank you for your support, good counsel and enthusiasm. I will miss the camaraderie, care and encouragement, and I wish every one of you well in the future as you continue the work in service to the young people who come through our doors.

I want to thank you, the parents of our students, past and present, for entrusting your sons and daughters to us for their education. I hope that we have answered that trust to the best of our ability over the years, and I believe the school will continue to do so into the future.

To the students, I encourage you to search in yourself for the God-given gifts you carry and grow into that capacity. Then you will go out into your lives with hope. Do whatever little act you can do today and every day for good, to transform our society for the best...

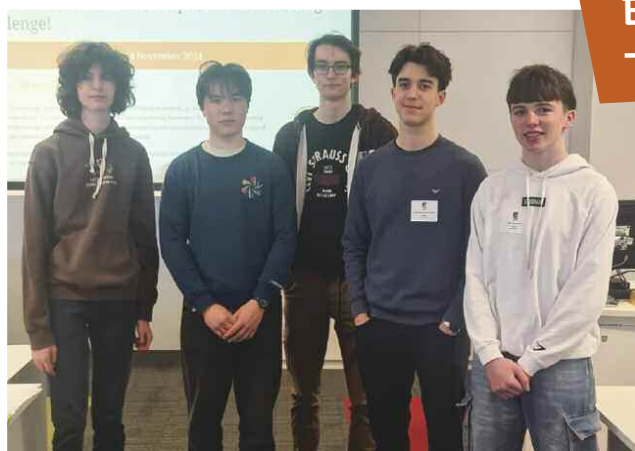

Guidance Counselling

With June and the State Exams fast approaching, another school year draws to a close. It has been a productive and very busy few months in the Guidance Department. All applications to the CAO were submitted by the 1st February deadline while Educational Impact Statements for D.A.R.E. applicants were supplied by the 15th March deadline. Information on Post Leaving Certificate courses, apprenticeships, SUSI grants, scholarships, career events and preparing for life after school was circulated to students both in Guidance classes, one to one appointments and on their Google Classroom. We continued to deliver the 'Reach+ Career and College Preparation Programme' to 5th and 6th years through their Guidance classes.

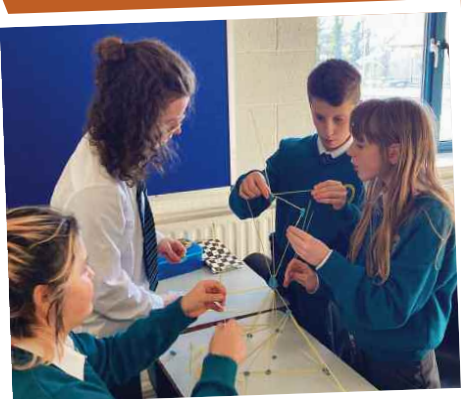
There were a number of invaluable information evenings facilitated by the Guidance Department addressing subject choice for incoming first years, for 1st years going into 2nd year, and the Senior Cycle subject options for 3rd and 4th years going into 5th year. Our sixth years were afforded the opportunity to visit many College open days with the school. We visited University College Cork, MTU Kerry and University of Limerick in October and the Careers Fair in November. Visiting these College campuses is invaluable to the students in helping them decide their future career path. We also gave our sixth years the opportunity to attend the Kerry College open day and brought a group of students to see the incredible facilities and courses on offer in the Monavalley and Clash campus. In addition, we had various speakers from Industry and Colleges visit the school throughout the year to present to 5th and 6th years including Liebherr, MTU, Kerry College, University of Galway and UL.

To initiate the process of getting students to think about their future career paths and help with subject choice, all 4th year students were registered with the Reach programme and given the opportunity to use the Career Interest test and Subject Choice tool. The students will continue to use this programme in 5th and 6th year. The first years were registered with the Reach Junior Cycle programme and will continue to work on this programme in 2nd and 3rd year in terms of Study Skills, Career Options and Self-Assessment. The Cognitive Abilities Test (CAT4) was administered to incoming 1st years in February.

Fourteen Senior Cycle students took part in SafePass training which was offered in school before Christmas. All students successfully completed the course and received a four year SafePass Certificate. Two Transition Year students were afforded the opportunity to participate in the 'Prep for Med' Day in UCC. They learned Clinical Skills, received a tour of the FLAME Anatomy laboratory and went to CUH to hear from various Medical professionals and watch a live Caesarian Section.

Finally, we would like to thank our colleagues, parents and management for their continuing support. We wish both the Junior and Leaving Certificate students well in their upcoming exams and we bid farewell to another group of Leaving Certificate students. We hope that they will be happy and fulfilled on the individual paths they have chosen. As they begin both their exams, and their journey on from here, we leave them with Winston Churchill's famous words '*Success is not final, failure is not fatal: it is the courage to continue that counts*' - believe in yourself and never give up.

Big Brother Big Sister Mentoring Programme



The Big Brother Big Sister mentoring programme kicked off in October. The aim of the programme is to help first years transition smoothly and successfully into Mercy Mounthawk and help them settle into post-primary school life. Participation in the programme gives both first and fourth years the opportunity to develop friendships and increase their confidence and interpersonal skills. 26 students got involved in the programme this year.

The participants met once a week during Thursday lunchtime. During this time, the students played board games, charades, team challenges, 30 seconds, cards, participated in a Christmas cookie decoration competition, went on a treasure hunt and had a chance to chat over hot chocolate and get to know others in the group. Fourth year students also helped first years with any questions they had about school, homework, study or lockers, but the main aim of the programme is to have fun. Both first and fourth years said they really enjoyed their participation in the programme.

Senior Debaters

This year, the halls of Mounthawk Secondary School once again echoed with the quick wit, sharp logic, and occasional dramatic flair of our Senior debate team.

From September to Spring, our 6th year debaters kept minds sharp and audiences entertained with a range of debates that were as thought-provoking as they were contentious.

The Team Maths competition has been a long-running activity of the Irish Maths Teachers' Association with regional rounds beginning in 1991 and National finals in 2005.

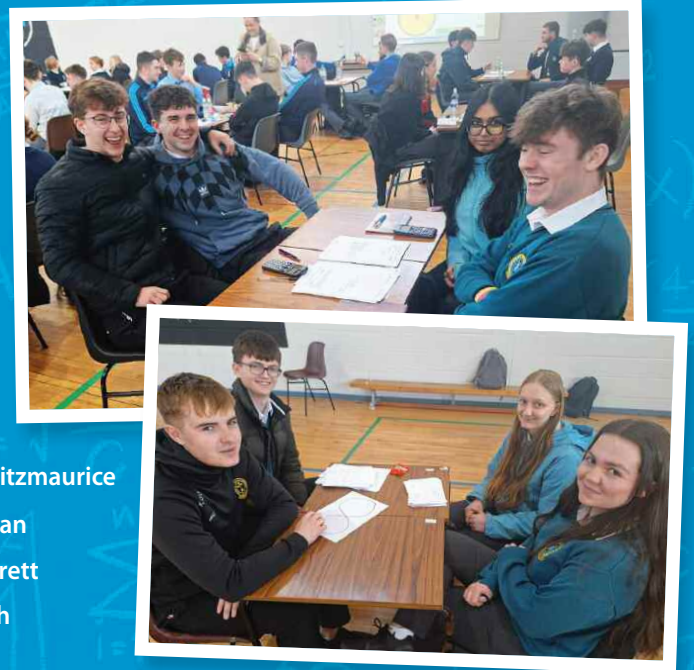

5th Year Visit to Liebherr for Engineers' Week

As part of Engineers' Week, our 5th Year students got the chance to visit the Liebherr factory in Killarney. The staff were very welcoming and gave the students a great tour of the site.

They explained how the machines are designed and built, and students got to see the different stages of the process up close. It was a really interesting visit, and many of the students said they learned a lot and really enjoyed it.

Talk from MTU Kerry - Mechanical and Manufacturing Engineering

We were delighted to welcome representatives from MTU Kerry to speak to our senior students about the MT834 Bachelor of Engineering in Mechanical and Manufacturing Engineering course.



They gave an overview of what the course involves and the different career paths it can lead to. Students also got the chance to try out some of the technology used in the course, including VR headsets, which gave them a real sense of what studying Engineering at MTU would be like.

It was a really engaging and informative session - thanks to the team from MTU Kerry for coming in and sharing their time and expertise.

A YEAR OF SUCCESS FOR Mounthawk Masterminds

The Mounthawk Masterminds (Culann Dowling, Francisco Hanafin, Conan Seino, Eamon Kissane, Aaron McElligott and James Daly) have had an incredibly successful year. The dedicated group of students from 2nd and 3rd year have combined engineering, innovation, and environmental awareness to achieve a high level of success in several national STEM competitions throughout the year.

FIRST LEGO League - Submerged Season

The Mounthawk Masterminds were one of 273 teams from across Ireland to take part in this year's FIRST® LEGO® League (FLL) SUBMERGED competition. FLL challenges students to solve real-world problems through four main areas: robot design, robot game, an innovation project, and core values such as teamwork and inclusion.

The team's robot, Jeffrey 3.0, featured a modular design with custom attachments and precision coding. It performed reliably in timed missions during the robot game. The team achieved 1st place in the regional final in TU Shannon & 2nd place in the All-Ireland finals in the robot game.

Their innovation project, 'Ocean Devotion', tackled microplastic pollution by designing a 3D-printed remote-controlled catamaran. The vessel uses a surface net and a ferrofluid-based magnetic filter to collect plastic waste without harming marine life. The project involved expert consultations, community surveys, and real-world testing.

After winning the regional final in TU Shannon in March, the team progressed to the All-Ireland Final in May, where they were awarded runner-up overall, placing them among the top young engineering teams in the country.

Eco-UNESCO Young Environmentalist Awards

The same innovation project, 'Ocean Devotion', was entered in the Eco-UNESCO Young Environmentalist Awards, where the team received the Overall Junior Water Category Award in a ceremony held at the Convention Centre in Dublin. Their work combined environmental engineering with education and community outreach.

The project included:

- Conducting a survey of 162 students to gauge awareness of microplastic pollution.
- Creating a collection of short stories about microplastic pollution written by 5th class students from Moyderwell Primary School.
- Organising a schoolyard cleanup and a beach cleanup with 25 students and Tralee Tidy Towns.
- Collaborating with marine conservationists and scientists to validate their design.
- Raising awareness about ocean plastics through presentations, school visits, and online outreach.



The group were also very lucky to be able to spend a day out at the Maharees Waterworld Diving Centre earlier in the year where they got hands-on diving lessons and learned about our local marine life. By blending environmental science with robotics, the Mounthawk Masterminds showed how innovation can contribute meaningfully to solving ecological challenges.

Culann Dowling - BD STEM Stars Award Winner

Team member, 3rd-year student Culann Dowling, won the Overall Software Award at the BD STEM Stars 2025 competition for his health-tech platform Physiopal. Designed as an app and website to support physiotherapy patients, Physiopal allows users to follow personalised exercise plans, track progress, and stay in touch with physiotherapists between sessions.

Culann developed the platform to meet real-world healthcare needs, combining front-end user design with back-end tracking features. His hard work was recognised at Ireland's largest regional STEM competition, which featured over 250 entries from across Munster.

CanSat Competition 2025 OUR SCHOOL'S JOURNEY TO THE SKIES

This year, our school proudly launched not one, but four ambitious teams into the regional finals of the CanSat competition - a national STEM challenge that asks students to think like real aerospace engineers... and then build like them, too.

What Is CanSat?

Imagine being handed a soda can. Now imagine turning that can into a fully functional satellite that's launched hundreds of meters into the sky, collects scientific data on its descent, and sends that data wirelessly back to Earth - all in real time. That's CanSat!

It's an incredible opportunity for students to apply science, technology, engineering, and maths in one exhilarating project, from soldering sensors to coding flight software - and all while working as a team.

Our Four Teams - One Mission: Innovation

This year, our students didn't just build satellites - they created mini-labs of the future. Here's a quick look at each team's creative mission:

- The Epic Gamers designed a CanSat that used a solar panel to monitor light intensity during descent. By tracking changes in ambient light, their satellite could help us understand environmental brightness patterns - a concept with possible applications in solar farm efficiency or even smart city lighting.
- Goal Diggers added a clever buzzer-based proximity alert system. When the CanSat approached the ground, it beeped - acting as a low-cost landing alert. While it may seem simple, this idea mirrors real-world tech that could be key in future drone deliveries or even flying cars to help detect safe landings.
- Hexadrive focused on humidity detection, aiming to analyse atmospheric moisture during descent. Their mission was a nod to modern climate science, exploring how miniaturised sensors can support environmental monitoring and even precision agriculture.
- Team Synergy, made up of Matthew Guerin, Eryk Musialkowski and Lewis Hughes, took things to the next level. Their CanSat was equipped to measure and analyse Earth's magnetic field throughout its flight. But this wasn't just for fun - the team was exploring how magnetic field patterns could affect animal migration and plant growth, opening up questions that connect space science with biology and ecology. Their cross-disciplinary mission showed how future satellites could help scientists better understand Earth's natural systems.

Launch Day - High Stakes, High Science

All four teams successfully launched their CanSats, gathered real-time wireless data, and met their mission objectives. The launches were carried out with precision and excitement, as students watched their satellites soar into the sky and return valuable telemetry data back to ground stations they had built themselves.

Conclusion - Future Engineers in the Making

This year's CanSat competition wasn't just about launching cans - it was about launching ideas, ambitions, and the next generation of innovators. Our students showed resilience, creativity, and technical skill throughout the process. With missions that spanned from solar science to magnetic mysteries, they demonstrated that the future of science is not only in safe hands - it's also thinking far ahead.

We couldn't be prouder of what all four teams achieved.

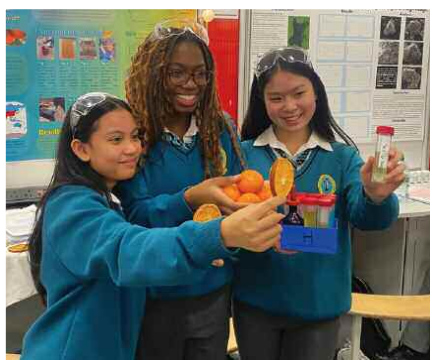

Mindfulness

Students in 4th Year participated in the 'Back to Breath' program, developed at UCC, which introduces Mindfulness to young people during their Tuesday Wellbeing class.

Mindfulness is a particular approach to lived experience. It helps students to untangle experiences by noticing sensations, thoughts, emotions and impulses to act, so as to savour what is good in life and respond constructively to experiences that challenge us. Stepping back from experience helps participants to relate better to themselves and the world beyond them. The formal practices undertaken in class help students to develop skills when life is calm, that can be used in times of greater challenge.

Some key learnings are that 'thoughts are not necessarily facts', how to decenter so as to take things a little less personally, noticing reactivity and learning to intentionally cultivate a more kindly, patient and gentle way of being with the self and others. Students learn about the stress cycle, how it's showing up for them and in people around them, and look at ways to attend to it.

It was hoped that these sessions would offer students a way of supporting themselves further through a year filled with many opportunities and challenges.

As part of Wellbeing Week 2025, Ms. Lucid's TY Academic English class organised a series of literacy-based games to share their love of literature with their peers. The students created 'The Word Zone', a two-hour event held in the Centenary Hall. It took weeks of careful planning and preparation to ensure everything ran smoothly on the day. Other TY groups were invited to take part in the games, all of which were hosted by Ms. Lucid's students. Activities included Wordle, Countdown, Bingo, Speed Dating, and more. It was an enjoyable event for everyone involved, especially the students who got to show off their karaoke skills after winning a round of Countdown.

This year a lot of work was completed as part of a 3-year plan to implement the new procedures in Mounthawk.

As well as work on policy, partnerships, and curriculum, the Steering Committee and the Student Council Wellbeing Committee produced an accessible School Culture and Values Declaration, a Cineáltas Charter. This charter outlines the school's culture and values and how they can help to prevent and address bullying in an age-appropriate manner. There was input from all members of the school community including focus groups with the student council, students, teachers and parents.



The charter was launched on 7th April during our Health Promotion Week. The week saw a series of fun events including a 5km run for 5th years, a quiz for 3rd years, a centenary session, as well as creative competitions and a fun 'Get to know the Staff' treasure hunt.

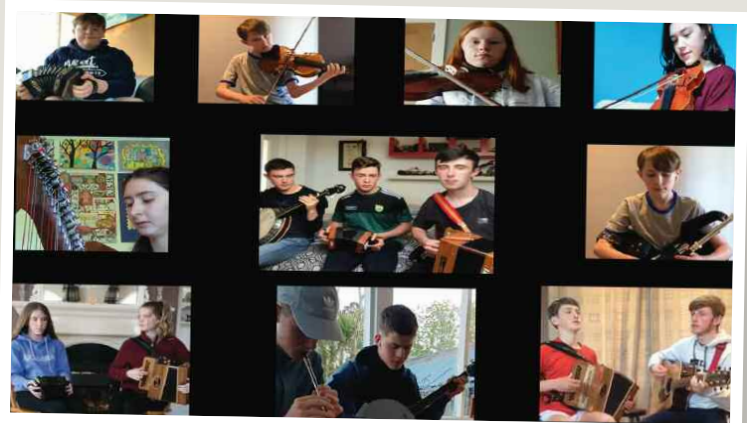

They also ran a powerful initiative - the 24-Hour No Phone Challenge, where students voluntarily gave up their phones. Many students even extended the challenge for over 48+ hours!

Another of their highly successful initiatives was the 'Back to Basics' fundraiser in aid of Jigsaw Kerry Youth Mental Health Services. This screen-free event included karaoke, Just Dance, board games, workshops and competitions, raising over €550 and promoting fun, connection, and wellbeing-without the use of phones.

In April, the group were honoured to be shortlisted for the National YSI Awards and nominated for the 'Digital Innovator Award' sponsored by Virgin Media. Our team travelled to Cork City Hall to take part in Speak Out, where we proudly presented our project. Most recently, we were honoured to be shortlisted for the Open and Equal Communities Award and invited to pitch virtually to a panel of YSI judges. We are passionate about spreading this idea nationally and believe every school deserves the knowledge to support a therapy dog like Bonnie.

Junk Kouture is rooted in the Transition Year programme in Mounthawk and supported by TY Co-ordinator Ronan Redican. 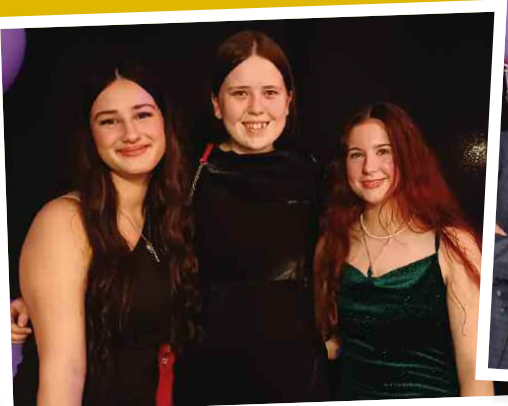

A Look Inside the Creative Schools Programme



This past year, our school proudly participated in the Creative Schools Programme, an exciting initiative led by the Arts Council that places creativity at the core of students' educational journeys. The programme aims to give young people meaningful opportunities to explore and express their creativity as an integral part of their learning experience - and here at our school, it has done just that.

We are currently drafting our Creative Schools Plan, a strategic roadmap that sets out clear goals and targets to guide the future of creativity in our school. This plan reflects our ongoing commitment to nurturing imagination, innovation, and collaboration across all areas of learning.

Creative February: A Month to Remember

A highlight of our year was Creative February, a week-long celebration filled with energy, imagination, and artistic flair. Over five days, we hosted 23 different activities ranging from workshops and competitions to daily creative challenges for students and staff alike. This vibrant programme was led by the Student Council Creativity Team, who played a central role in planning and coordinating events - showcasing incredible student leadership and vision.

Spotlight on Innovation: The Creative Arcade

One of the exciting projects underway is our Creative Arcade led by our Tech Wizard Will Nolan - a bold and collaborative initiative bringing together students and staff from Coding, Computer Science, Woodwork, and Art. Students are designing and coding

original games, which are then brought to life through custom-built arcade cabinets. These will feature repurposed computers, arcade-style controllers, and striking hand-crafted artwork.

This project is a shining example of cross-curricular learning and student creativity in action. It offers hands-on, real-world experience and will leave a lasting legacy in the form of interactive, playable art that the entire school community can enjoy.

Moving to the Rhythm: Contemporary Dance

Thanks to the efforts of Charlotte Tansley, we welcomed choreographer Joanne Barry to run contemporary dance classes. These sessions introduced students to new and expressive forms of movement - encouraging confidence, creativity, and connection through dance. For many students, it was their first encounter with this unique art form, and it left a lasting impact.

History Meets Hollywood

Creativity made its way into the History Department as well, where teacher Niamh Fitzgerald tasked students with producing their own medieval movies. In groups, students researched roles in medieval society and brought them to life through short films using drama, animation, and voiceover narration. It was an engaging way to explore the past - through the lens of the future.

As we continue our Creative Schools journey, these experiences remind us how vital creativity is - not just in the arts, but in how we learn, collaborate, and grow. We look forward to seeing even more innovation, expression, and imagination in the months ahead!



School of Excellence in Creativity Award

SECA Pilot Programme Flourishes in Our School

Last year, our school proudly began its journey as part of the SECA (Schools of Excellence in Creativity Award) Pilot Programme - an exciting national initiative that promotes innovation and creativity in teaching and learning. We are delighted to announce that this programme will continue into the next academic year, building on the many successes and lessons learned so far.

At the heart of our school is a vibrant culture of innovation that continues to flourish. From Lego Club and STEM Academy to BT Young Scientist Awards, school musicals, Art and Home Economics competitions, chess, debating, creative writing, book and songwriting clubs - creativity is not confined to one classroom but celebrated across all corners of our school community.

Our staff set high expectations and provide students with an education that is both engaging and challenging. Teaching and learning are continually evolving through carousel in-house training days and regular CPD sessions, particularly in the integration of digital technologies. A strong sense of professional collaboration exists among our teachers, who openly share best practices and support one another's growth.

As we continue our SECA journey, we are also reflecting on how we can grow further. Priorities for improvement include nurturing a deeper culture of reflection and collaboration among staff, encouraging students to develop creative and critical thinking skills in line with the Junior and Senior Cycle curriculums, and addressing students' fear of peer judgement, which can sometimes hinder creative risk-taking. A key focus will be on developing a whole-school strategy to promote higher-order questioning and support students in taking ownership of their creativity.



The Creativity Wheel Raising Creative Thinkers

To support these aims, several initiatives will be implemented, including:

- The introduction of a "WonderWall" page in student journals to spark curiosity and encourage questioning.
- Whole-school strategies identified by teachers to foster critical thinking and creativity.
- A "Questioning Toolkit" for teachers to enhance classroom dialogue and inspire imaginative thinking.

We are incredibly proud of the progress made so far and excited about the opportunities ahead. The SECA Pilot Programme has already enriched our school culture, and with continued commitment from staff and students, we look forward to an even more creative and innovative future.

School's Self-Evaluation 24/25: REFLECTING, REVIEWING AND RENEWING



As we arrive at the end of another academic year, we share with you an overview of our School Self-Evaluation (SSE) process for 24/25.

Under the SSE process 2022-26 and the Strategic plan for the school 24/27 endorsed by the new Board this year, we had School Improvement Plans (SIPs) in four key areas of school life: **Attendance, Wellbeing, Digital Literacy and Learning** and **Teaching** using the 6 step process and the data to guide meaningful improvements in our school.

SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT PLAN (SIP) 1 ATTENDANCE

Attendance has been prioritised as one of the key areas in our School Strategic Plan. Based on the data collected in 23/24 in step 3/4 of the SSE cycle, the implementation step (5) of the SIP in 24/25 focused on identifying, supporting and re-engaging individual students with patterns of poor attendance.

Students identified were individually supported through **early interventions**, typically involving initial supportive conversations with Assistant Year Heads. These meetings aimed to understand and address underlying challenges, while building daily routines for the students. **Regular informal morning check-ins** were introduced to create a welcoming environment, reinforce student-teacher connections, and encourage consistent attendance. Where poor attendance continued for some students, Year Teams extended their supports to include **structured meetings** with both students and their parents/guardians. These meetings aimed to strengthen home-school partnerships and were deliberately framed in a supportive and solution-focused manner.

One key development this year has been the creation of our Mercy Mounthawk student-centred intervention tool, '**Enlisting the Voice of the Student**' Toolkit. This resource has been designed to enable more meaningful dialogue with students and their families and to guide the co-construction of personalised attendance improvement plans. Following evaluation, this Toolkit has been piloted and is now scheduled for full implementation with 2nd, 5th and 6th Year cohorts in September 2025.

We will also implement the 'Enlisting the Voice of the Student' toolkit across identified year groups and evaluate its impact. This work will allow us to develop a school-wide attendance policy rooted in restorative, inclusive practices, and continue to develop home-school links, particularly with families where attendance challenges persist.

SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT PLAN 2 WELLBEING

The school engaged with the Bí Cineálta process this year. In Step 2 of the SSE cycle, through a comprehensive consultation process with our staff, students and parents, our **Anti-Bullying Bí Cineálta charter and policy** were created and ratified. The Charter outlines the school's culture and values and how we can help to prevent and address bullying in an appropriate manner. The charter was launched for Mounthawk's Health Promotion Week on April 7th, marked by the raising of the Cineáltas flag.

We are fortunate to have an active **Student Council Wellbeing Committee** who hold weekly lunchtime meetings. This group has been involved in the organising of a number of wellbeing events including **Anti-Bullying Week and Wellbeing Week**. During the weekly **Wednesday Assemblies** Deputy-Principal Mr. Kissane and Ms. McBride continued to provide advice to students regarding their mental health, eating well, the importance of exercise and acknowledging the achievements of their fellow students, which has proven to be hugely positive for our students' overall wellbeing. **Mindfulness workshops** were provided to our students by Ms. McKenna, which were immensely popular.

SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT PLAN 3 ICT AND DIGITAL LITERACY

As part of our ongoing SSE process, Digital Literacy has been a core area requiring targeted development based on the imminent changes to the **new Senior Cycle** - which will see a significant increase in project work for our students going forward, and consequently, an increased demand on the ICT resources we currently have in our school. In step 2/3 of the SSE cycle in 24/25, a school-wide consultation and research process took place to explore possible strategies for improving student access to devices. Based on this, for the 25/26 school year, the school has initiated a **Chromebook purchase scheme** for incoming and existing Senior Cycle students on an opt-in basis, with parental engagement and guidance provided.



The school's **Digital Learning Team** is currently updating our **Digital Learning Plan (DLP)** to incorporate this initiative and to extend structured digital skills development across all years. Plans are in place (stage 4 of the cycle) to trial a new course in TY for 25/26 to address the identified deficit for students in IT skills sets (such as typing skills, filing, research and analysis, image process, etc.). Staff CPD is also planned in the use of technology and AI in the classroom, especially in light of the challenges managing the integrity of student work in the production of projects for the State Examinations.

SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT PLAN 4 LEARNING AND TEACHING - CREATIVITY

Allied to the changes in curriculum and the skills sets published for the new TY curriculum and the new LC curriculum, teachers identified a need to focus on the development of critical thinking and creativity skills for students. This has become the focus for our SIP on creativity.

In 24/25, we participated in a pilot project with the Department of Education to explore methodologies which would help promote Creative Thinking called '**Schools of Excellence in Creativity**'. A full 6 step SSE cycle was run in this project in 24/25 and a report on the cycle was submitted to the inspectorate in May co-ordinated by the core team. Following research, the teacher team adopted a methodology called the '**Wonder Wall**' poster as a means of encouraging creativity in our students, along with other methodologies in scaffolding questioning. The data gathered as part of the research with students into their attitudes towards creative thinking will now guide the project next year in developing the link between Creative and Critical Thinking skills, by creating a learning environment for our students where higher order reasoning and problem solving will be encouraged and celebrated as part of the Creative process.

As part of the project, the **Student Council Creativity Team** was also created who, guided by our Creative Co-ordinator, Ms. Ryan, ran a most successful **Mounthawk Creativity Festival** for both students and staff.

MERCY MOUNTHAWK STRATEGIC PLAN 2024 - 2027

Under the Strategic plan for the development of the school, 24/25 saw the **delivery of the modular building** (comprising 3 classrooms and 2 special classes). This allowed us to engage with the NCSE in the opening of two Special Classes for students with Autism. The classes have opened successfully and we have filled the spaces available at this point. This is a very important development in the support and service that we are able to provide for our students and in meeting students' needs in an optimal fashion.

The school also participated this year in the **COTHÚ initiative** with our trust body CEIST. A core group of teachers from the school participated in this pilot project which provided a chance to explore the possible approaches that might be taken within our school to work with staff on the area of school ethos. This initiative will be developed next year with an initial process on ethos taking place with staff over the course of the year. It is important that we can identify as a school what is central to our ethos as it is lived on a daily basis and that we have a chance to discuss and encourage that living out of the values which underpin our school.



Making History: Kerry Camogie Leagues Now Established Across All School Grades



This year marked a major milestone for camogie in Kerry's Post-Primary schools. For the first time, we had a fully established Kerry Colleges' Camogie League running across Senior, Junior, and 1st Year levels - a tremendous step forward for the sport in our county. In previous years, schools had to travel to neighbouring counties for competitions, so the creation of our own local leagues across all grades is a huge achievement.

This league was developed through the dedicated efforts of our coaches here at Mercy Mounthawk, working closely with Ms. Jackie Horgan (Causeway Comprehensive), and supported throughout by County Chairperson Annemarie Russell and Development Officer Siobhán O'Donoghue.

Scollard Cup Senior Champions - March 2025

A standout moment this year was our Senior Camogie team's thrilling victory in the Scollard Cup Final - Kerry's premier schools' competition, now in its 2nd year. In a closely-fought battle, they triumphed over Causeway Comprehensive to bring the cup back to Mounthawk for the second time.

Led by co-captains Orla Leahy and Maeve Trant, the team showed great heart and determination. A special mention to our brilliant 6th years Ruth O'Connor, Róisín Quinn, and captains Orla and Maeve, who made their final league game one to remember. What a way to finish - champions once again!

Munster Finalists - Hayes Intermediate Cup March 2025

Our Senior team also represented the school with pride in the Munster Final of the Hayes Intermediate Cup, where they gave a heroic performance against a strong Buttevant side.

Despite the narrow loss, the team showed relentless drive, equalising the match several times and fighting right to the final whistle. A late goal and point saw Buttevant take the win, but we could not be more proud of the Mounthawk girls' resilience and effort. Heads held high!

Kerry Group All Schools Junior Cup & Shield Champions - April 2025

April was a huge month for our Junior Camogie teams, who claimed both the Junior Cup and Junior Shield titles in the Kerry Group All Schools competition held in Caherslee. With 11 teams from 6 schools participating, it was a fantastic celebration of camogie - proudly hosted and organised by Mercy Mounthawk.

A huge congratulations to Hayley Fitzgerald-O'Connor, who was named Junior Player of the Tournament, standing out among 96 players across the county - a phenomenal achievement! Thanks to Kerry Group and Ruth Colleran, Head of Group Tax, for their ongoing support and for presenting the trophies on the day. Their commitment to supporting girls in sport is deeply appreciated.

Mounthawk Badminton Club - A lunchtime smash hit!



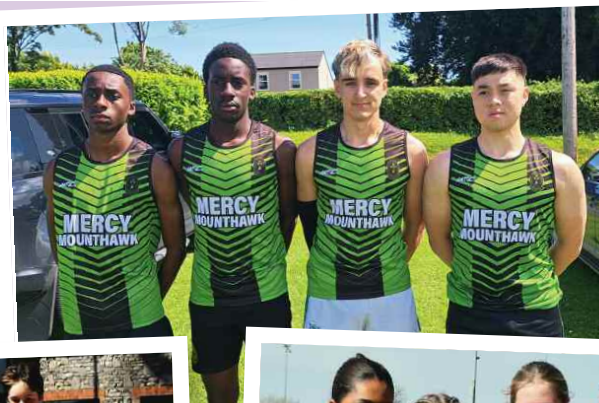

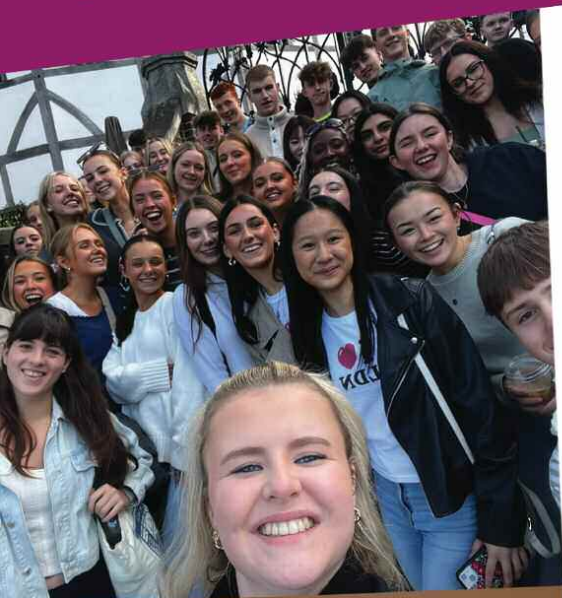

We flew back through Luton, exhausted but happy after three unforgettable days. The London trip gave me memories I'll always treasure and helped forge friendships that made my final year even more special.

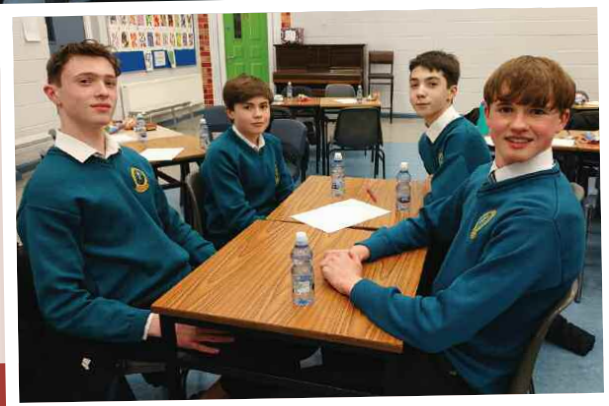
To any future 6th years reading this, who are on the fence about going - I have one word for you: GO!

Mounthawk Cycles to School

As part of our new long-term 'Sustownability' project, for the last six months Mounthawk students were encouraged to cycle to school as often as possible. Each Friday, during the cold weather, cyclists were greeted with cups of hot chocolate topped with cream and marshmallows. On the more recent sunny, warmer days, all those who cycled received tokens for ice cream at break time. The students from the Student Council Environment Committee met early every Friday morning to undertake this awareness-raising venture, and their videos on social media have garnered thousands of views. On Friday 23rd May we held a cycle to town, to highlight the new cycling infrastructure that will be put in place by the County Council, the National Transport Authority and the Safe Routes to School Programme. Tomasz from ATOM Bicycle Repairs came to the school on the day before the event and carried out minor repairs/adjustments to students' bicycles.

After the cycle, students met with County Counsellor Angie Baily and Engineer Joyce O'Boyle from the County Council. Joyce has been working with the school to develop the plans for making cycling and walking to school safer. The new plans were put on display in Centenary Hall and the students were given a presentation on what the Council and school hope to achieve with respect to sustainable travel to and from school.

We will be developing a new cycling/walking entrance to the school from the greenway while at the same time installing traffic calming measures in the vicinity of the main entrance on the Caherslee road. The cycle lanes will be widened and will be segregated from motor traffic. Students from all parts of town are encouraged to cycle to school every day, and to further help things along, the school will be installing new bicycle shelters to help keep bikes safe and dry.

For students who must be dropped off by car, we encourage parents to drop their children away from the school entrance and that students make the rest of their way to school on foot. The school entrance and the 150 m length of roadway immediately

outside the school gate will be redesigned and improved to ensure students are safer when they walk or cycle. We will also ask that parents in cars do not approach the school entrance at the end of the school day. Students will walk to meet their parents at a place of their choosing. The segregated cycle lanes will not be available for car-parking.

When we return to school in autumn and before the new infrastructure is in place we will hold information meetings for parents and students in the school.

Garden and Pond Re-Development

Over the past few months, we have re-developed the pond, garden and orchard. On a number of consecutive Saturdays the Student Council Environment Committee came to school to begin this part of the "Sustownability" project. They worked closely with Ian McGregor from Gortbrac Organic farm who guided the group on how to trim trees and hedges without causing long term damage. We were shown how to make a dead hedge and began the placement of one by the pond and another at the front of the school by our small grove. The native species grove was planted by students in 2021 and is doing very well indeed as can be seen by the before and after pictures from this year and 2021.

We are also in the process of refurbishing the raised beds and have completed the purchase of 100m of pressure treated timber which the Environment Committee will use in the autumn to replace the old rotting timbers.

The pond has been carefully cleared out, while being extremely mindful of the frogs who use it, so we did not commence this until April/May after the frogspawn had turned into little frogs who then departed for their preferred habitat of the damp areas in the long grass. Frogs don't actually live in ponds, they go there mainly to breed but on occasion they go just to hang out!

The students also cleared a pathway through the orchard towards the proposed new entrance gate. This gate was installed in Summer 2001 and has never been used or indeed opened. It will come into use during the next academic year as part of the Safe Routes to School Programme upgrade of the cycling and walking infrastructure inside and outside of the school grounds.

Planting trees is always a good idea, so we planted almost one hundred trees at one of the school boundaries. Species include: Hawthorn, Oak, Alder, Silver Birch and Beech. The trees were small with bare roots and the students were shown how to properly place these in the ground. They learned that the trees will slowly establish roots over two or three years and will then begin to show themselves properly at about four or five years after planting. The trees were supplied free of charge by Easy Treesie (<https://easytreesie.com/>).

Coming next year:

We will begin our education outreach to local primary schools, community groups and within Mercy Mounthawk. Our students have already formed workgroups based on some of the Sustainable Development Goals: Climate Change, Life on Land, Sustainable Towns and Cities (looking at transport and sustainable food systems), Life Below Water and Quality Education. They have produced learning materials/tools which they will use for their presentations over the next few years. One of these will examine what the world might look like at 4°C warmer than it is now. Others will examine and promote home composting, while the Quality Education group has researched the benefits of fulltime education in poor countries with a particular emphasis on the education of young women. The food group will begin the process of integrating vegetarian/vegan options into the school canteen. We will work with students, parents and the canteen providers to provide a number of sample menus to see which is the preferred

option. We aim to have new canteen items on the menu before October break.

The work of the Environment Committee goes under our own project name of 'Sustownability' which will run from 2025 until 2030. We received grant funding of €2,500 to implement the project from the Department of Education: Education for Sustainable Development.

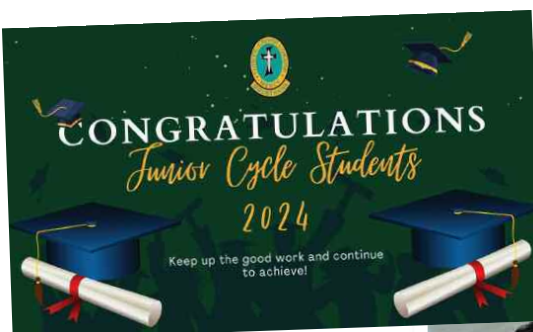

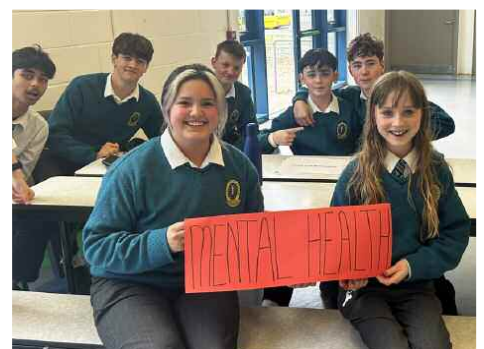
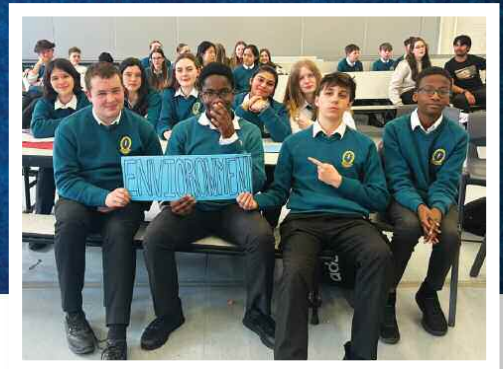

European Studies

There were many great achievements by the TY EPAS (European Ambassador School) this year. Ten students represented the school at the Munster Session of the European Youth Parliament in Cork. Aoibheann McCarthy was selected from Munster to attend the National Session of the Parliament in Dublin.

Sophie Mitchell, Joel Oguariri and Risteárd Harty represented Cyprus at a Model Council event in Dublin Castle. A lot of preparation went into the event which included a zoom with the ambassador for Cyprus, Louis Telemachou. The team had an outstanding performance on the day which involved 6 hours of active debates.

To end the year the class organised a Mock European parliament for Junior Cycle students to debate issues relating to the environment, mental health and gender equality. MEP Seán Kelly was the guest speaker at the event. The class completed all pillars of the Ambassador School Programme and were certified as Junior Ambassadors for the European Parliament at the end of the final term.



Equity, Diversity and Inclusion

In May, we invited guest speaker Baisat Alawiye from Minority Teachers Ireland to the school to deliver three workshops on EDI.

Baisat is a newly-qualified teacher and her workshops are informed by her experience of being Black and Irish, a student and a teacher. The first workshop was on Allyship, and on fostering whole-school inclusivity. We spoke about covert and overt racism, how to support ourselves and our friends when we see racism occur, and about intercultural understanding and respect. The second workshop was about Taking Up Space as students from minority backgrounds and Baisat discussed barriers that minority students face, the importance of representation, and she also encouraged more students like her to enter into teaching - because representation matters! The third workshop was for teachers on What I Wish my Teacher Knew, and it fostered greater understanding of the lived experience of minority students in the education context. We explored micro-aggressions, the importance of valuing cultural traditions and norms (everything from names to hair, to food and assertiveness), and the need to decolonise our curriculum and classrooms in tangible ways.



It was a fantastic day of learning, and another important day in Mercy Mounthawk as we strive to foster a truly inclusive school community where everyone belongs and feels respected and valued.

Mercy Mounthawk's Spanish Immersion Trip to Madrid



From February 8th to 22nd, 14 students from Mercy Mounthawk took part in an unforgettable Spanish immersion programme in Madrid. Organised in collaboration with Language Activities International (LAI), the experience offered us a unique chance to live with Spanish host families, attend a local secondary school, and fully immerse ourselves in the culture, language, and daily life of Spain.

Life with Host Families

Our arrival in Madrid was met with warmth and kindness from our host families. They welcomed us into their homes like one of their own, helping us settle in and encouraging us to practice Spanish in real, everyday situations. Sundays were dedicated to quality time with our hosts - often involving sightseeing and enjoying traditional homemade Spanish meals together.

Cultural Discoveries

Twice a week, on Wednesdays and Saturdays, we took part in cultural excursions around Madrid. These outings included walking tours through the heart of the city, visits to the Royal Palace, Retiro Park, the National Archaeological Museum, and the Prado Museum.

School and Daily Routine

Each morning, we commuted to school either on foot or by bus, where we joined local students in class. The Spanish school environment was welcoming and provided an authentic insight into daily academic life. During breaks, churros and coffee at nearby cafés became a cherished ritual, and after classes ended around lunchtime, we were free to explore the city. Whether it was shopping, sightseeing, or just soaking up the Madrid atmosphere, every afternoon brought new adventures.

Gaining Independence

This trip wasn't just about improving our Spanish - it was also a major step in personal growth. From navigating airports and managing our own travel to confidently using Madrid's Metro system, we learned how to be independent and responsible in a new country.

This two-week immersion left a lasting impact. We returned home with stronger Spanish skills, greater independence, better understanding of the language and a newfound appreciation for Spanish culture. Many of us have been invited back to Madrid to our host families whenever we please.
